Dear Friends,

In these days of challenge and difficult news, it feels like a hard season. There is so much news which is disturbing, and so much worry and illness. We are not quite sure what will happen next.

Sometimes we see the Christmas story through a sentimental haze, angels and shepherds and stars. They were indeed present, and wonder is part of the Christmas story.

However that first Christmas was also a challenging time. For Mary, she had to place her trust in God, even when she did not fully understand this news about the baby that was to be born. Joseph had to be reassured by an angel in a dream, to be willing to believe that this was all part of God's plan. And then they had to leave Nazareth and go to Bethlehem because of a government census, when Mary was almost ready to give birth, and then the birth itself round the back of an inn amongst the animals. As I write this article we are in the final throes of uniting with our sister church of Temple Anniesland. We are soon to be known as Knightswood Anniesland Trinity with Rev. Fiona Gardiner at the helm. I have been asked what my opinion of this process is and will I be attending the united church wherever that final place is determined. My answer is yes of course. I do have the privilege of being a peripatetic 'preacher' (my children have adapted that to a very pathetic preacher! – what can I say - the respect of the younger generation is hard won these days!) In the years that I have been a Reader. I have had the opportunity to lead worship in no less than thirty eight different congregations of varying sizes. It has always been anxiety provoking when I have no idea what the congregation is like. What are the people looking for from their speaker? Are there intellectual giants in the congregation? You have all been very generous and supportive of my efforts, which I never forget comes from God, through me, and when it's messy, then that is me interfering with said message, like white noise in an audio recording! I apologise for that and I want to thank you all for your support, it has meant a lot to me and has kept me striving to elevate the Good News of Jesus. Saviour of the world, to an appropriate level in all of our daily lives. A big thank you to you all. I will close with those wonderful words that remind us all of our individual part in the building of a church community, "Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain." (Psalm 127:1) We are all working for God and he is in control not any of us, thankfully! I also take this opportunity to wish you all a Happy Christmas and peaceful (COVID free) New Year.

We have reached this stage because of many factors, not least declining membership. The nation has changed, society has changed and the Church as a whole has suffered as people put their faith in their politicians, their football teams (not me on that one) and themselves to the extent that attendance at worship and church membership have plummeted.

The pandemic hasn't helped but sometimes we have struggled even to get the maximum of 50 allowed during the restrictions and that's not all down to fear of the virus and yet, as you'll see elsewhere in this magazine, we have had terrific support from the congregation, small though it is.

These are difficult times we know, but I would ask you to stay with us, and when the time comes get involved, because while it's a new situation for us at St Margaret's, it's just the same for those at Temple Anniesland and, for that matter, St David's. The hope is we'll emerge bigger and stronger.
